VIII. CONSENT AGENDA

One motion, non-debatable, to approve the "recommendations" noted. Any member of the Council may ask for an item to be taken from the consent agenda for discussion and separate action.

A. Motion approving the minutes of the October 26, 2021 City Council Meeting.

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B. Motion approving the October 2021 Municipal Division Summary Report for Municipal Court.

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C. Motion approving renewal of Cigna employer provided health insurance with an increase of 18.4%; Delta Dental employer provided dental insurance with an increase of 0%; Superior Vision employer provided vision insurance with an increase of 0%; and New Directions EAP employer provided benefit with an increase of 0% effective January 1, 2022.

Cigna employer provided health insurance, beginning January 1, 2022, will renew with a 18.4% rate increase. The increase in the amount the City contributes is expected to have an annual impact of approximately \$423,000 (all funds). The amount the city contributes for an individual plan will increase \$115.92 per month (from \$630.02 to \$745.94) and the amount the city contributes for a family plan will increase \$305.06 per month (from \$1,172.69 to \$1,477.75). The PPO is the base plan that is offered to employees by the City. The out-of-pocket amount paid by employees for the PPO Individual only will remain \$0. The out-of-pocket amount paid by employees for the PPO Family will remain \$485.26 per month. The out-of-

pocket amount paid by employees for the PPO Employee Plus will decrease (\$32.51) to \$276.03 per month. The out-of-pocket amount paid by employees for the HMO Individual only will increase (\$14.64) to \$94.20 per month. The out-of-pocket amount paid by employees for the HMO Family will increase (\$38.73) to \$734.45 per month. The out-of-pocket amount paid by employees for the HMO Employee Plus will increase (\$1.99) to \$498.05 per month. The out-of-pocket amount paid by employees for the HDHP Individual only will remain \$0 and the HSA contribution paid by the City will increase (\$11.18) to \$71.90 per month. The out-of-pocket amount paid by employees for the HDHP Family will decrease (\$29.04) to \$298.40 per month. The out-of-pocket amount paid by employees for the HDHP Family will decrease (\$58.58) to \$108.32 per month.

Delta Dental employer provided dental insurance, beginning January 1, 2022, will renew with a 0% rate increase and 2-year rate guarantee. The amount the city contributes for an individual plan will remain \$43.43 per month and the amount the city contributes for a family plan will remain \$107.36 per month.

Superior Vision employer provided vision insurance, beginning January 1, 2022, will renew with a 0% rate increase and 2-year rate guarantee. The amount the city contributes for an individual plan will remain \$5.78 per month, the amount the city contributes for an employee plus one plan will remain \$11.21 per month and the amount the city contributes for a family plan will remain \$16.45 per month.

New Directions EAP employer provided benefit will renew with a 0% rate increase. The amount the city contributes for each employee will remain \$30.24 per year.

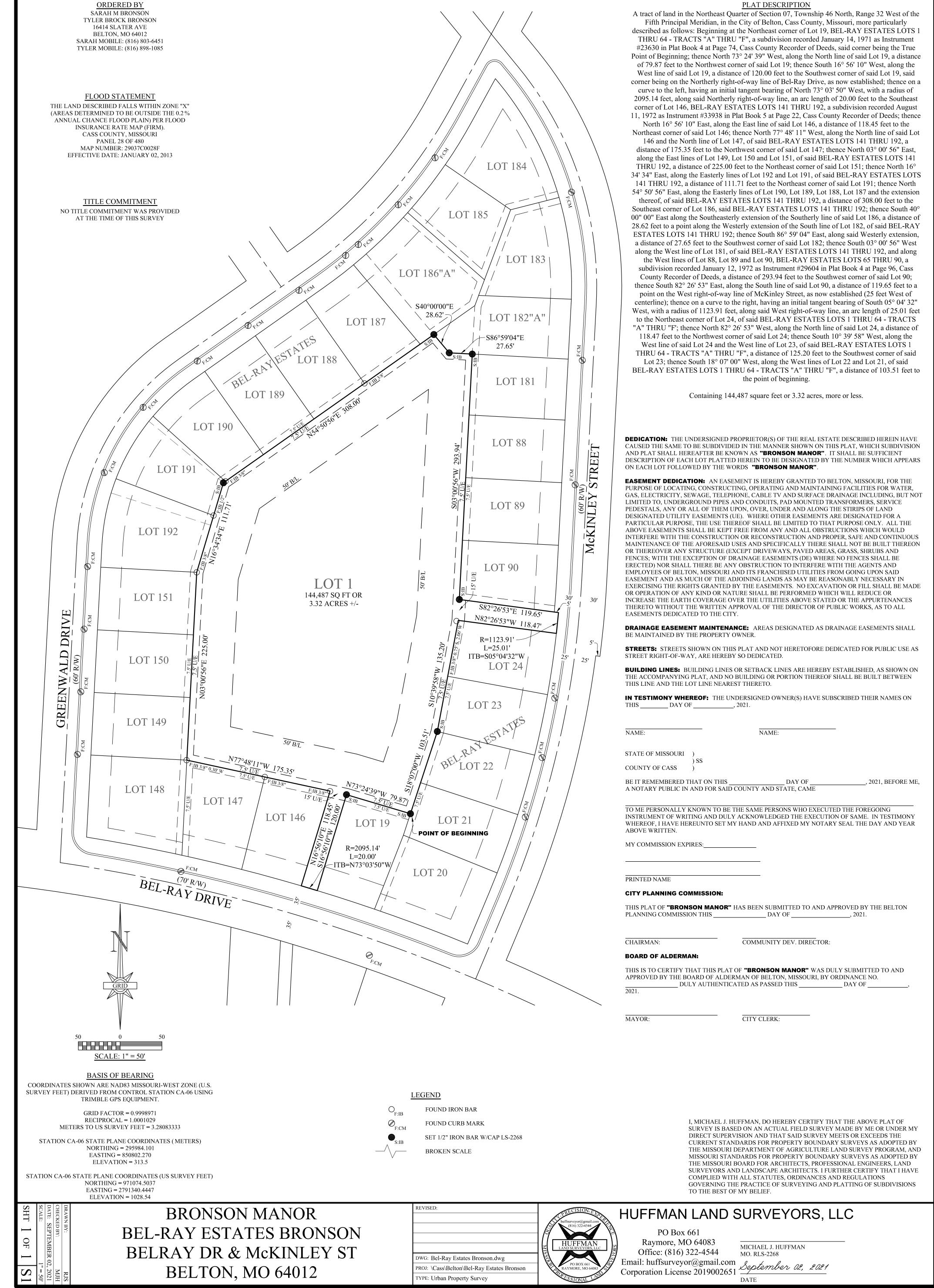
Consideration of Noise Standards

City Code of Ordinances- Chapter 14 Nuisances

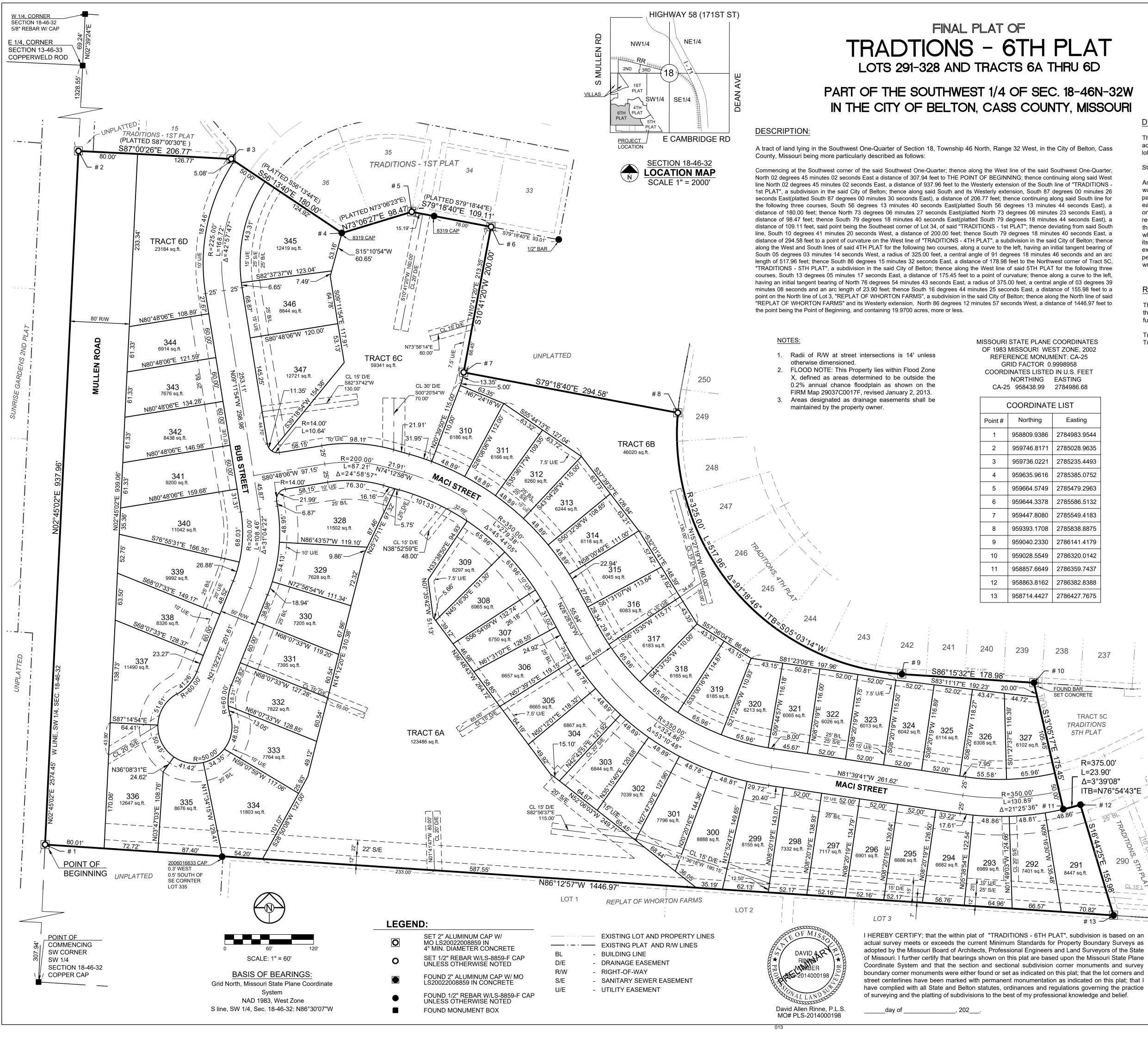
Article IV of the Chapter includes prohibitions on noise from loudspeakers, public entertainment, construction in residential districts and engine exhausts. To better address noise from specific land-use activities, staff recommends that noise standards be considered and established on a case-by-case basis with rezoning and development applications to better address specific noise considerations on a land-use basis. Require noise standards and levels be appropriately addressed with development applications.

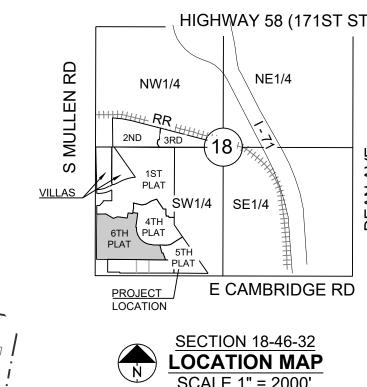

An easement is hereby granted to Belton, Missouri, for the purpose of locating, constructing, operating and maintaining facilities for water, gas, electricity, sewage, telephone, cable tv and surface drainage including but not limited to, underground pipes and conduits, pad mounted transformers, service pedestals, any or all of them upon, over, under and along the strips of land designated utility easements (U/E). Where other easements are designated for a particular purpose, the use thereof shall be limited to that purpose only. All the above easements shall be kept free from any and all obstructions which would interfere with the construction or reconstruction and proper, safe and continuous maintenance of the aforesaid uses and specifically there shall not be built thereon or thereover any structure (except driveways, paved areas, grass, shrubs and fences; with the exception of drainage easements (D/E) where no fences shall be erected) nor shall there be any obstruction to interfere with the agents and employees of Belton, Missouri and its franchised utilities from going upon said easement and as much of the adjoining lands as may be reasonably necessary in exercising the rights granted to the easements. No excavation or fill shall be made or operation of any kind or nature shall be performed which would reduce or increase the earth coverage over utilities above stated or the appurtenances thereto without the written approval of the Director of Public Works, as to all easements dedicated to the City. **RESTRICTIONS:** The use of all Lots and Tracts of land in this subdivision shall hereafter be subject to any and all covenants and restrictions recorded in the office of the Register of Deeds of Cass County, Missouri and shall hereby become a part of the dedication of this plat as though fully set forth hereon. Tracts 6B AND 6D are common open areas to be owned and maintained by the homeowners's association. Tract 6A AND 6C are detention tracts to be owned and maintained by the homeowners's association. Minutes of the Belton City Council October 26, 2021 City Hall Annex 520 Main Street, Belton, Missouri

Mayor Larkey called the work session to order at 6:00 p.m.

Mike Groszek, Troutt, Beeman & Co. P.C., presented the Comprehensive Annual Financial Report for year ended March 31, 2021.

Laura Ellis, Belton Court Administrator, provided a review of the monthly court summary that is approved by the Council.

Sheila Ernzen, Acting City Manager and Finance Director, said the engagement letter for Baker Tilly US, LLP to provide executive recruitment for the City Manager position is on tonight's agenda.

John Sapp, Fire Chief, presented the City's recreational burning and open burning regulations.

Scott Lyons, Police Chief, presented an overview of ATVs / golf carts / recreational off-highway vehicles. The Council consensus was to move forward with allowing golf carts and recreational off-highway vehicles in Belton.

Dave Clements, Director of Planning and Building, provided a report of UDC amendments approved by the Planning Commission on September 20, 2021. This item will be coming to the November 9, 2021 Council meeting.

Greg Rokos, Public Works Director, provided an update on the Route 58 & Powell Multimodal Traffic Relief Project Design. The project will last through 2023.

Mr. Rokos reviewed with the Council the American Rescue Plan Act of 2021 (ARPA) money allowable uses. There are only two allowable uses that work for Belton – premium pay for essential workers and water/sewer work. The Council consensus was to move forward with these allowable costs. Ms. Ernzen will bring a budget amendment to the November 9, 2021 Council meeting.

Mr. Rokos said there is an item on tonight's agenda for a Wastewater Treatment Plant aerator replacement. This is a critical item to the treatment plant and is within budget.

Mr. Rokos provided an update on the Bradford Place traffic study. They found a 3-way stop sign needed to be removed. The general speed through the subdivision was 25 mph.

Ms. Ernzen said three rental management companies responded to staff's request to manage the house on 2nd Street until the Council decides on future development of the area. The Council consensus was to rent out the house and hire a management company.

Chief Sapp said Belton did not receive the SAFER grant. The Fire Department is still in need of three additional firefighter positions. Ms. Ernzen said funding for this will come from the public safety sales tax dollars. This item is on tonight's agenda.

Being no further business, Mayor Larkey adjourned the work session at 7:47 p.m. and called the meeting to order.

Councilmember Clark led the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag.

PERSONAL APPEARANCES

Chris Richardson with Downtown Belton Main Street, Inc., 325 Main St, said DBMS voted to do a Christmas light show on Main Street. They are requesting the street be closed from Herschel Street to Chestnut Street, including the intersections of Ella Street and Walnut Street, for the Mayor's Christmas Tree Lighting and Christmas on Main; November 27, 2021 from 4:30 p.m. – midnight; December 3-4; 10-11; 17-18, 2021 from 5:00 p.m. – midnight; and January 7-8, 2022 from 5:00 p.m. – midnight. It was decided the street closure would begin at 6 p.m. and not 5 p.m. on the dates in December and January. There was a discussion about parking. Stephanie Davidson, 119 Mill St, was present to represent Belton Community Projects, Inc (BCPI). BCPI's tenant at old city hall is Main Street Theater. BCPI, DBMS, and city staff have spoken regarding accommodating parking for the Theater productions.

A motion approving the street closure requested by Downtown Belton Main Street, Inc., for the dates and times listed in the application and presented to the City Council on October 26, 2021, subject to Belton Main Street, Inc., and Belton Community Projects, Inc., coordinating the supervision, access, cordoning off, management, security, and safety of certain parking facilities owned by the City of Belton that may be utilized by Belton Main Street, Inc. and Belton Community Projects, Inc. during the relevant time period.

Presented by Councilmember Clark, seconded by Councilmember Trutzel. Diane Huckshorn, Chamber of Commerce Executive Director, 517 Main St, asked if this motion and decision was only for Christmas on Main. Padraic Corcoran, Attorney, said yes, only for this event. All present voted in favor except Councilmember Powell who abstained. Motion carried.

Josh Lansdale and Steven Smith with KC Holiday Light Pros, 300 SW Newport Dr, Blue Springs, MO, said DBMS has hired them to light up Main St. They will be plugging into city-owned properties.

A motion allowing KC Holiday Light Pros to plug into the City streets.

Presented by Councilmember Clark, seconded by Councilmember Trutzel. All present voted in favor. Motion carried.

Andrea Cunningham, City Clerk, gave the final reading of Bill No. 2021-59: An ordinance of the City of Belton, Missouri amending Chapter 2, Division 4 – Personnel Code, Section 2-558(A) – legal holidays of the Code of Ordinances of the City of Belton, Missouri.

2021 Christmas on Main PUBLIC SERVICE AGREEMENT BY AND BETWEEN THE CITY OF BELTON AND DOWNTOWN BELTON MAIN STREET, INC

This Agreement made and entered into this _____ day of _____, 2021, is by and between Downtown Belton Main Street, Inc., a Missouri nonprofit corporation (hereinafter "Main Street"), and the City of Belton, Missouri, a Missouri constitutional charter city (hereinafter "City").

WITNESSETH:

WHEREAS, Main Street was created to provide education and charitable resources in order to promote and strengthen a diverse central business district and preserve historic character and assets in the City; and

WHEREAS, as part of its public purpose, Main Street sponsors the Christmas on Main and has requested City assistance in providing access to certain City properties on Main Street and other services as detailed in **Attachment A** to this Agreement for the Christmas on Main; and

WHEREAS, the City has determined that the Christmas on Main is in the best interest of the City because it promotes the general health, safety, and welfare of the City, provides economic development activities, and promotes a public purpose.

NOW THEREFORE, in consideration of mutual undertakings and mutual benefits from the services set forth herein, the City and Main Street agree as follows:

I. SCOPE OF SERVICES

Main Street will sponsor, organize, promote, and provide administrative oversight for the Christmas on Main, as outlined in **Attachment A** of this Agreement, on <u>November 27, 2021</u>; <u>December 3-4</u>; 10-11; 17-18, 2021; and January 7-8, 2022 for the benefit of the citizens of the City of Belton, Missouri.

II. CONTRIBUTION IN SUPPORT OF PUBLIC PURPOSE

To facilitate a public purpose, the City agrees to provide access to certain City properties along Main Street for the Christmas on Main and other services as detailed in **Attachment A** to this Agreement.

III. TERM AND TIME OF PERFORMANCE

The term of this Agreement shall be effective on <u>November 27, 2021; December 3-4; 10-11; 17-18, 2021; and January 7-8, 2022</u>.

IV. ASSIGNMENT/SUBCONTRACTS

Main Street and the City hereby agree that this Agreement shall not be assigned, transferred, conveyed, or otherwise disposed of without the specific consent of the other party to the Agreement.

Subcontracting for electrical work; for portable toilets; to Belton Community Projects, Inc (BCPI); to 2A Marketing; or to the Belton Chamber of Commerce may be done without specific consent of the City.

V. NON-DISCRIMINATION PROVISIONS

Main Street and its subcontractors will not discriminate against any employee or applicant for employment because of race, color, disability, age, religion, sex, or national origin. Main Street will take affirmative action to ensure that applicants are employed in good faith. Main Street and its subcontractors will comply with all provisions of Executive Order 11246 of September 24, 1965, and of the rules, regulations, and relevant orders of the Secretary of Labor.

VI. COMPLIANCE WITH THE LAW

All parties shall comply with all applicable federal, state, and local laws, ordinances, codes, and regulations.

VII. INTEREST OF LOCAL PUBLIC OFFICE

No member of the City Council of the City, or any officer, employee, or agent of the City who exercises any functions or responsibilities in connection with review or approval of the work to which this Agreement pertains, shall have any personal interest, direct or indirect, in the Agreement of the proceeds thereof except as permitted by the law of the State of Missouri.

VIII. INDEPENDENT CONTRACTOR

Main Street is not authorized or empowered to make any commitments or incur any obligation on behalf of the City and is merely acting as an independent contractor.

IX. INDEMNIFICATION

Main Street shall indemnify, release, defend, become responsible for, and forever hold harmless the City, its officers, agents, employees, elected officials, and attorneys, each in their official and individual capacities, subject to the provisions set forth in the Missouri Sovereign Immunity Statute, from and against all lawsuits, suits, actions, costs, claims, demands, damages, disability, losses, expenses, including reasonable attorney's fees and other defense costs, or liabilities, of any character and from any cause whatsoever brought because of bodily injury or death received or sustained, or loss or damage received or sustained, by any person, persons, or property arising out of or resulting from any act, error, omission, or intentional act of Main Street or its agents, employees, or subcontractors, arising out of or in any way connected with the operations expressly authorized herein; provided, however, that Main Street need not save harmless the City from claims, demands, losses, and expenses arising out of the sole negligence of the City, its employees or agents. In addition, the City shall not be liable or responsible in any manner to any subcontractor with whom Main Street has contracted for additional services under the terms of the Agreement.

X. TERMINATION OF THIS AGREEMENT

The City may terminate this Agreement at any time upon providing Main Street written notification of the same. Either party shall have the right at its option to terminate this Agreement and be free of all obligations hereunder in the event that the other party is in default or violation of the terms, conditions, assurance, or certifications of this Agreement. Non appropriation of funds by the City Council shall not be considered a violation or default of this Agreement.

XI. NOTICE

Any notice required by this contract is deemed to be given if it is mailed by United States certified mail, postage prepaid, and addressed as hereinafter specified.

XII. AMENDMENTS

In order to provide necessary flexibility for the most effective execution of this Agreement, whenever both the City and Main Street mutually agree, changes to this Agreement may be effected by placing them in written form and incorporating them into this Agreement as an amendment.

XIII. SEVERABILITY

It is mutually agreed that in case any provision of this Agreement is determined by a court of law to be unconstitutional, illegal, or unenforceable, it is the intention of the parties that all the other provisions of this Agreement shall remain in full force and effect.

XIV. ENTIRE AGREEMENT

This Agreement constitutes the entire agreement between the parties with respect to its subject matter and any prior agreements, understandings, or other matters, whether oral or written, are hereby merged into and made a part hereof, and are of no further force or affect.

XV. FORCE MAJEURE

The Parties shall be excused from performance during the time and to the extent that they are prevented from obtaining, delivering, or performing by act of God, adverse weather conditions, fire, strike, loss or shortage of transportation facilities, lock-out, commandeering of materials, products, plants or facilities by the government, compliance with any law, ordinance, regulation, ruling, order or other governmental action, or other contingencies the non-occurrence of which was a basic assumption on which this agreement was made, when satisfactory evidence is presented to the City, provided that it is satisfactorily established that the non-performance is not due to the fault or neglect of the party not performing.

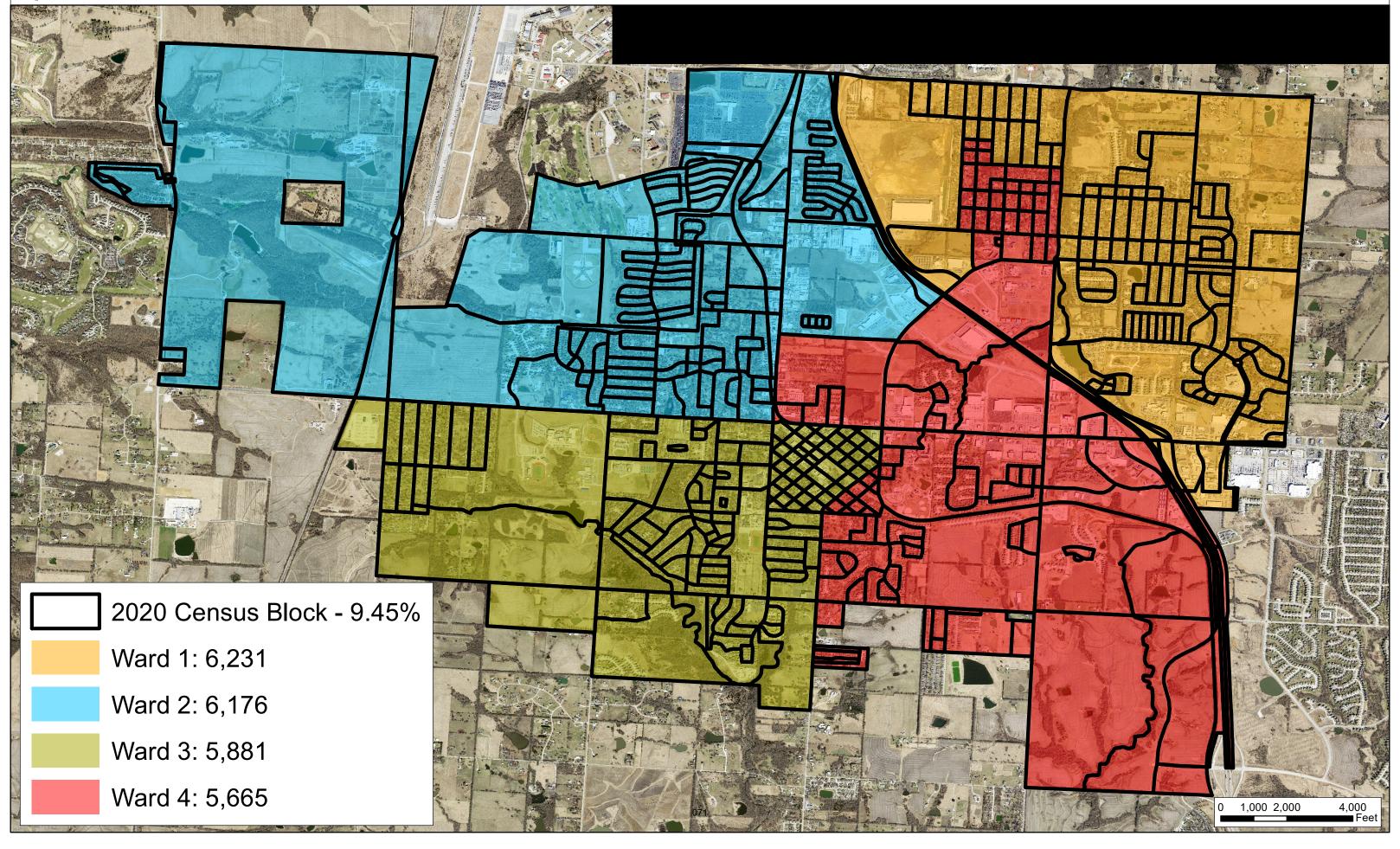

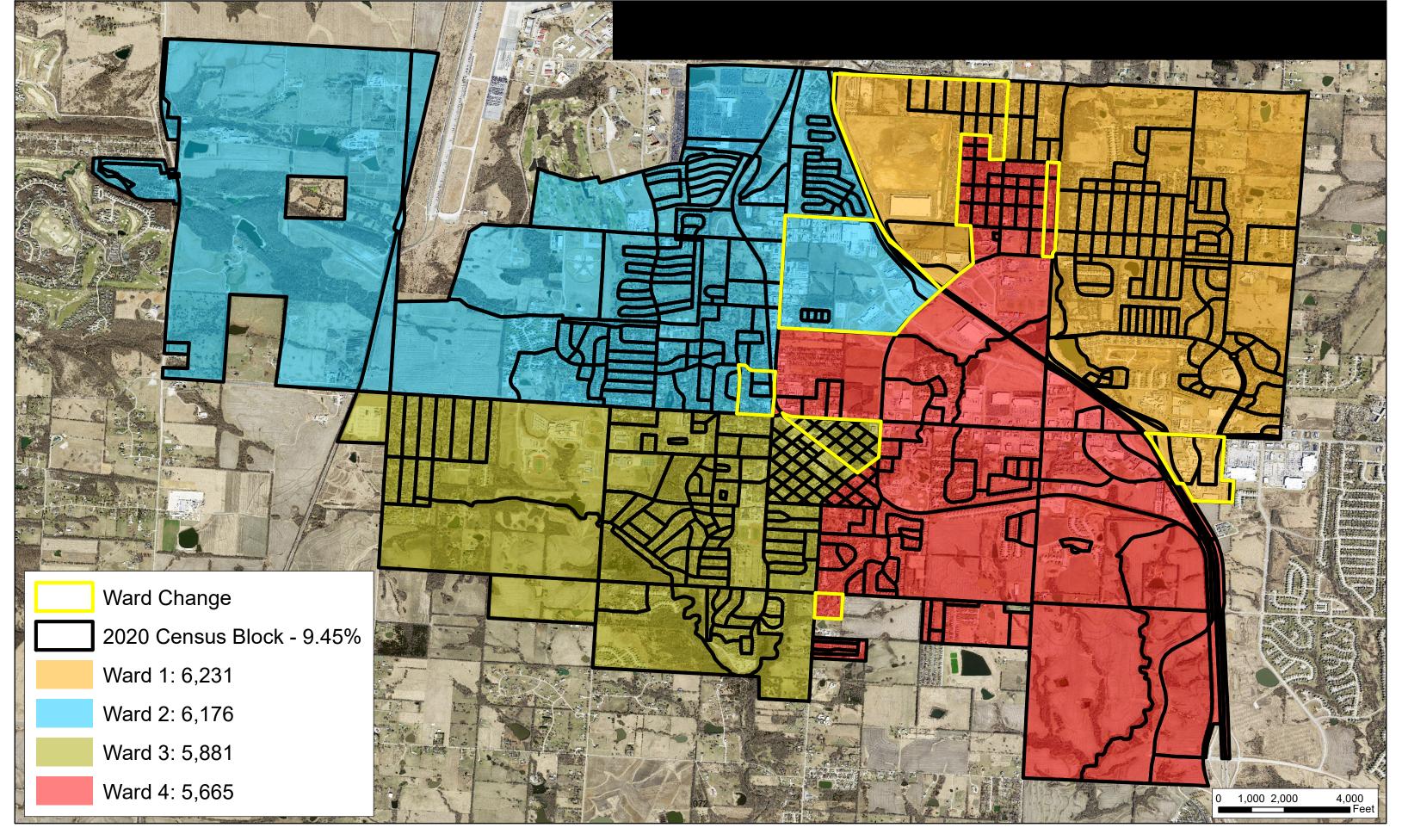

SECTION IX F

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING SECTIONS 4; 12-4(b)(1); 20-2(a); 26-5(4); 28-5(b); 32-1(4)(e); AND 36-108(2) OF THE UNIFIED DEVELOPMENT CODE TO CLARIFY EXISTING STANDARDS AND CREATE NEW REGULATIONS DEEMED NECESSARY TO IMPROVE THE EFFECTIVENESS OF THE CODE.

WHEREAS, the City of Belton adopted the Unified Development Code ("UDC") December 13, 2011; and

WHEREAS, Section 4 – Accessory uses and structures outlines the standards for accessory uses and structures in all zoning types. This section of the code is hereby amended to revise existing language and create a new section outlining the standards for accessory dwelling units; and

WHEREAS, Section 12-4(b)(1) – Additional regulations outlines the standards for outdoor display or storage of merchandise in business, commercial, and industrial districts. The section is hereby amended to ensure pedestrians have accessibility to sidewalks; and

WHEREAS, Section 20-2(a) – Planning commission public hearing outlines the requirements pertaining to required mailings for a public hearing. This section is hereby amended to require posting of a "Public Hearing Notice" sign as part of the notification requirements for rezoning and special use applications; and

WHEREAS, Section 26-5(4) – Residential driveways outlines the standards for residential driveways providing ingress or egress to a public or private street. This section of the code is hereby amended to add language specifying material requirements for the right-of-way/drive approach on residential driveways regardless of the lot type; and

WHEREAS, Section 28-5(b) – Site design outlines performance standards pertaining to sidewalks for new developments. This section of the code is hereby amended to clarify the existing standards of sidewalk construction on new developments; and

WHEREAS, Section 32-1(4)(e) – Payment in lieu of detention explains the option for payment in lieu of providing on-site detention for properties that are located within the Markey Regional Detention Watershed. This section of the code is hereby amended to update the rate charged per impervious acre using the Consumer Price Index for Construction; and

WHEREAS, Section 36-108(2) – Required improvements outlines the required improvements that a subdivider must install or provide installation of within all new developments. This section of the code is hereby amended to update the standards pertaining to sidewalk construction improvements; and

WHEREAS, after due public notice was given in the manner prescribed by law, the Planning Commission held a public hearing on Monday, September 20, 2021. The Planning Commission voted 6-1 to recommend approval to the City Council; and

WHEREAS, the City Council believes the various text amendment changes in various chapters are in the best interest of the citizens.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL THE CITY OF BELTON, CASS COUNTY, MISSOURI, AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. That Chapter 4 – Accessory Uses and Structures, of the Belton Unified Development Code is hereby amended with the additions in bold print and deletions with strike through notation as follows:

Sec. 4-1(c)(2) – Use limitations

(2) No accessory structure shall be used for dwelling purposes except apartment garages **and permitted accessory dwelling units.**

Sec. 4-4 – Accessory dwelling units

An accessory dwelling unit (ADU) is a dwelling unit that is accessory to a principal single family dwelling unit on the same lot.

- (1) The ADU shall meet all the regulations, setbacks, and lot coverage requirements of Section 4-1.
- (2) The ADU shall not be larger than the principal structure.
- (3) The ADU shall not exceed the height of the principal structure.
- (4) The ADU shall be constructed of building materials that are compatible with the principal structure.
- (5) The ADU shall be constructed on a permanent foundation or slab and meet all the requirements of the applicable building codes.
- (6) A separate address shall be posted on the ADU for emergency services.
- (7) Parking for an ADU shall comply with the provisions of Chapter 26 of the Unified Development Code.
- **Section 2.** That Chapter 12 Commercial, Industrial, Parks, Recreation and Public Use Zoning Districts, Section 12-4(b)(1) Additional Regulations, of the Belton Unified Development Code is hereby amended and revised with the **additions in bold print** and deletions with strike through notation as follows:

Sec. 12-4(b)(1) – Additional regulations

(b) Outdoor display or storage of merchandise. Outdoor display or storage of merchandise is permitted in business, commercial and industrial districts subject to the following:

- (1) No display or storage of merchandise shall occur within:
- (a) Required parking spaces;
- (b) Landscaped areas;
- (c) Fire lanes;
- (d) On sidewalks if handicapped pedestrian accessibility is blocked;
- (e) Building setback areas; or
- (f) Under un-sprinkled overhangs of sprinkled buildings.
- Section 3. That Chapter 20 Land Use Applications and Procedures, Section 20-2(a)
 Procedures for Zoning Map and Text Amendments, of the Belton Unified Development Code is hereby amended and revised with the additions in bold print and deletions with strike through notation as follows:
 - Sec. 20-2(a) Procedures for Zoning Map and Text Amendments
 - (a) *Planning commission public hearing*. All proposed text and map amendments must be submitted to the planning commission for review and recommendation. The planning commission must hold a public hearing on the application. The public hearing must be held at the next regular meeting of the planning commission for which the application may be scheduled given public notice deadlines unless the applicant has consented to an extension of this time period. The applicant shall send certified letters to the most recent property owner of record for all properties within 185 feet of the subject property 15 days prior to the public hearing. The applicant shall provide proof of such mailing to city staff prior to the public hearing. In the case of a rezoning application or special use permit, the applicant shall place a sign on the property informing the public that a hearing will be held at a specific time and place concerning proposed changes in use.
 - (1) The sign shall be placed at a property line abutting the street and be readily visible to the general public.
 - (2) The sign shall be furnished by the City to the applicant.
 - (3) The applicant shall maintain the sign for at least fifteen (15) days immediately preceding the date of the public hearing.
 - (4) The applicant shall file an affidavit with the secretary of the Planning Commission at the time of the public hearing verifying that the sign has been maintained and posted as required by this ordinance and applicable resolutions.

(5) Upon conclusion of the public hearing, the applicant shall remove the sign and return it to the City.

- Section 4. That Chapter 26 Parking, Loading and Access, Section 26-5(4) Residential Driveways, of the Belton Unified Development Code is hereby amended and revised with the additions in bold print and deletions with strike through notation as follows:
 - Sec. 26-5(4) Residential driveways

(4) All residential driveways except those in the A and R-1B districts must be paved with a permanent material such as asphalt, concrete, paving blocks, or other approved material meeting the standards of the city. Driveway aprons or access from the public street shall be concrete to meet standard specifications for public improvements in the right-ofway.

- Section 5. That Chapter 28 Performance Standards, Section 28-5(b) Site Design, of the Belton Unified Development Code is hereby amended and revised with the additions in bold print and deletions with strike through notation as follows:
 - Sec. 28-5(b) Site design

(b) Buildings shall connect to sidewalks and other pedestrian connections within the site and to adjacent **building** sites.

- Section 6. That Chapter 32 Stormwater Detention Requirements, Section 32-1(4)(e) Payment in Lieu of Detention, of the Belton Unified Development Code is hereby amended and revised with the additions in bold print and deletions with strike through notation as follows:
 - Sec. 32-1(4)(e) Payment in lieu of detention

(e) In all regards, the payment shall be calculated at a rate (the "Rate") of \$5,100.00 \$5,900.00 per impervious acre of development as set out in the approved Study. The payment for the property being developed shall be made to the city before a building permit will be issued for the development. After March 1, 2015 the rate shall be increased every March 1st using an escalator fact based upon the Consumer Price Index for Construction.

- Section 7. That Chapter 36 Subdivision Regulations, Section 36-108(2) Required Improvements, of the Belton Unified Development Code is hereby amended and revised with the additions in bold print and deletions with strike through notation as follows:
 - Sec. 36-108(2) Required improvements

(2) *Walks*. Sidewalks shall be installed on both sides of all residential streets upon which houses face. Sidewalks shall be required on both sides of the street in any commercial or industrial district and on all collector and arterial streets. All sidewalks shall not be less than four feet in width along residential streets and not less than five feet in width along arterial streets and shall comply with the specifications of the city council. Sidewalks from the new improvement (subdivision, building, factory, etc.) shall be constructed along arterial and collector streets to the meet existing sidewalks or to the next developed properties, whichever are closer. All sidewalks shall not be less than five feet in width and shall comply with the specifications of the city council. Sidewalks shall be located in the platted street right-of-way, six feet from back-of-curb to near the face of the sidewalk. Walks shall also be installed in any pedestrian easements as may be required by the city council. Sidewalks shall be maintained by the abutting property owner.

- **Section 8.** That this Ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after the date of its passage and approval.
- **Section 9.** All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict with the provisions are hereby repealed.

SECTION IX G

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING CHAPTER 13, ARTICLE IX OF THE CODE OF ORDINANCES OF THE CITY OF BELTON, MISSOURI BY ESTABLISHING DIVISION 7, UTILITY VEHICLES, RECREATIONAL OFF-HIGHWAY VEHICLES, AND GOLF CARTS, REGULATING THE USE OF CERTAIN SPECIAL VEHICLES IN THE CITY OF BELTON, MISSOURI; AND AMENDING CHAPTER 13, ARTICLE IX, DIVISION 4, SECTION 13-465, SAFETY HELMETS REQUIRED TO CONFORM TO CHANGES SET OUT IN HOUSE BILL 1963.

WHEREAS, Chapter 304 of the Revised Statutes of Missouri, specifically Sections 304.032 through 304.034, authorizes cities to permit and regulate the operation of utility vehicles, recreational off-highway vehicles, and golf carts on city streets by the adoption of an appropriate ordinance; and

WHEREAS, it is in the best interest of public health and safety for the City to adopt an ordinance to regulate utility vehicles, recreational off-highway vehicles, and golf carts on city streets; and

WHEREAS, the Governor of Missouri signed into law H.B. 1963 which, in part, amended Chapter 302 of the Missouri Revised Statues by amending Section 302.020(2), which eliminated the mandatory use of helmets by all motorcyclists; and

WHEREAS, the City Council desires to regulate utility vehicles, recreational off-highway vehicles, and golf carts and to amend the Code of Ordinances to conform with H.B. 1963.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF BELTON, CASS COUNTY, MISSOURI, AS FOLLOWS:

- Section 1. That Chapter 13, Article IX of the Code of Ordinances of the City of Belton, Missouri is hereby amended by adding Division 7, Utility Vehicles, Recreational Off-Highway Vehicles, and Golf Carts as set forth in **Exhibit A** attached hereto and incorporated as if fully set forth herein by reference hereto.
- Section 2. That Chapter 13, Article IX, Division 4, Section 13-465 Safety Helmets Required of the Code of Ordinances of the City of Belton, Missouri is hereby amended as set forth in **Exhibit B** attached hereto and incorporated as if fully set forth herein by reference hereto.
- Section 3. That the codifier will assign appropriate numbers to sections and other subdivisions as to be inserted into the Code.
- Section 4. That all ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict with the provisions hereof are hereby repealed.
- Section 5. That this ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after the date of its passage and approval.

Exhibit A

DIVISION 7. - UTILITY VEHICLES, RECREATIONAL OFF-HIGHWAY VEHICLES, AND GOLF CARTS

Definitions

Utility vehicle means any motorized vehicle manufactured and used exclusively for off-highway use which is more than fifty inches but no more than eighty inches in width, measured from outside of tire rim to outside of tire rim, with an unladen dry weight of three thousand five hundred pounds or less, traveling on no less than four wheels, to be used primarily for landscaping, lawn care, or maintenance purposes. RSMo 301.010(71)

Recreational off-highway vehicle means any motorized vehicle manufactured and used exclusively for off-highway use which is more than fifty inches but no more than eighty inches in width, measured from outside of tire rim to outside of tire rim, with an unladen dry weight of three thousand five hundred pounds or less, traveling on four or more nonhighway tires and which may have access to ATV trails. RSMo 301.010(50)

Golf cart means a motor vehicle that is designed and manufactured for operation on a golf course for sporting or recreational purposes and that is not capable of exceeding speeds of twenty miles per hour. RSMo 304.034(3)

Utility Vehicles or Recreational Off-Highway Vehicle

- (a) No person shall operate a utility vehicle or recreational off-highway vehicle upon the streets or highways of this city, except as follows:
 - 1) Vehicles owned and operated by a governmental entity for official use.
 - 2) Vehicles operated for agricultural purposes or industrial on-premises purposes between the official sunrise and sunset on the day of operation, unless equipped with proper lighting.
 - 3) Vehicles operated by handicapped persons for short distances occasionally only on the city's secondary roads when operated between the hours of sunrise and sunset.
 - 4) Governing bodies of cities may issue special permits for utility vehicles or recreational off-highway vehicles to be used on city streets or highways within the city limits by licensed drivers. The fee for the annual permit shall be fifteen dollars (\$15.00). The permit shall be affixed to the left rear fender of the vehicle.
- (b) A person operating a utility vehicle or recreational off-highway vehicle on a city street or highway shall have a valid operator's or chauffeur's driver's license but shall not be required to have passed an examination for the operation of a motorcycle.
- (c) The operator of a utility vehicle or recreational off-highway vehicle is required to obey all the same traffic laws as an operator of a motor vehicle and all other applicable municipal ordinances.

- (d) No person shall operate a utility vehicle or recreational off-highway vehicle as defined in this Article on any city street or highway:
 - 1) In excess of the posted speed limit.
 - 2) In any careless way so as to endanger the person or property of another.
 - 3) While under the influence of alcohol or any controlled substance.
 - 4) Without proof of financial responsibility in accordance with Section 303.160 RSMo or maintain any other insurance policy providing equivalent liability coverage for a utility vehicle. If stopped, the operator of the vehicle will be required to show proof of insurance coverage.
 - 5) With a passenger or rider, unless said vehicle is designed for passengers or riders; provided however, that in no event shall the operator allow more passengers than the number of seats or passenger allowance is for the utility vehicle or recreational off-road vehicle.
- (e) Every utility vehicle or recreational off-highway vehicle operated on a city street or highway within the City shall have the following equipment:
 - 1) A lighted headlamp and tail lamp which shall be in operation at any time from one-half hour after sunset to one-half hour before sunrise or as otherwise specified in Section 307.020 RSMo (definition of "When lighted lamps are required").
 - 2) A braking system maintained in good operating condition.
 - 3) An adequate muffler system in good working condition and a United States Forest Service qualified spark arrester.
 - 4) A safety belt or harness for driver and occupant(s).
 - 5) A recreational off-highway vehicle (only) shall have a bicycle safety flag which extends not less than seven feet above the ground, attached to the rear of the vehicle. The bicycle safety flag shall be triangular with an area of not less than thirty square inches and shall be day-glow in color.

Golf Carts

(a) No person shall operate a golf cart upon the streets of this city, except as follows:

- 1) Golf carts owned and operated by a governmental entity for official use.
- 2) Golf carts whose operators carry a special permit issued by the City pursuant to this section and affixed to the left rear fender of the vehicle. The fee for the annual permit shall be fifteen dollars (\$15.00).
- (b) A golf cart shall not be operated at any time on any state or federal highway but may be operated upon such highway in order to cross a portion of the state highway system which intersects a municipal street. No golf cart shall cross any highway at an intersection where the highway being crossed has posted speed limit of more than forty-five miles per hour.
- (c) A person operating a golf cart on a city street shall have a valid operator's driver's license.

- (d) The operator of a golf cart is required to obey all the same traffic laws as an operator of a motor vehicle and all other applicable municipal ordinances.
- (e) No person shall operate a golf cart as defined in this Article on any city street:
 - 1) In excess of the posted speed limit, but under no circumstance shall the golf cart be operated in excess of twenty miles per hour.
 - 2) In any careless way so as to endanger a person or property of another.
 - 3) While under the influence of alcohol or any controlled substance.
 - 4) Without proof of financial responsibility in accordance with Section 303.160 RSMo or maintain any other insurance policy providing equivalent liability coverage for a golf cart. If stopped, the operator of the golf cart will be required to show proof of insurance coverage.
 - 5) With a passenger or rider, unless the golf cart is designed for passengers or riders; provided however, that in no event shall the operator allow more passengers than the number of seats or passenger allowance is for the golf cart.
- (f) Every golf cart operated on a city street within the City shall have the following equipment:
 - 1) A lighted headlamp and tail lamp which shall be in operation at any time from one-half hour after sunset to one-half hour before sunrise or as otherwise specified in Section 307.020 RSMo (definition of "When lighted lamps are required").
 - i. The headlamp shall be mounted at the same level on each side of the front of the vehicle and the tail lamp, red in color, shall be mounted at the same level on each of the rear of the vehicle.
 - 2) A braking system maintained in good operating condition.
 - 3) A bicycle safety flag which extends not less than seven feet above the ground, attached to the rear of the vehicle. The bicycle safety flag shall be triangular with an area of not less than thirty square inches and shall be day-glow in color.

State law reference - RSMo 304.034

Penalty

(a) Any person who knowingly violates any provision of this Article is guilty of an ordinance violation and, upon conviction thereof, shall be punished by a fine. If any person knowingly violates any provision in the presence of a peace officer possessing the duty and power of arrest for violation of the general criminal laws of the state or for violation of ordinances of counties or municipalities of the state, said officer may impound the vehicle involved. Additionally, the court may require suspension of the special permit, prohibiting operation of the vehicle within the city limits.

Exhibit B

Sec. 13-465. Safety helmets required.

Every person under twenty-six years of age who is operating or riding as a passenger on any motorcycle, motorized bicycles, and motor scooters while on public roads, streets, highways, alleys, or surfaces open to public use by custom or habit as a roadway of this city shall be required to wear on their head firmly affixed helmets that meet the requirements of the National Safety Council, the state and the city.
